# Oltjen to form own orthodontics practice

After almost 16 years together, orthodontists Jay Oltjen and Joe Hannah are going their separate ways.

Oltjen is creating his own practice and will operate regional offices in Olathe, Overland Park, Atchison and Paola.

He is also planning to build a new office building just south of 151st Street and Black Bob Road in Olathe that will open in the fall of 2011.

Both doctors will practice in

the existing office at 151st Street and Ridgview Road while Oltjen develops the new location.

"In order to realize my goals for Oltjen Orthodontics, I felt it was important to modernize my Olathe office space to include a larger more comfortable reception area and technical advancements including digital X-rays and computers at every chair," Oltjen said.

Oltjen said he has sold his interest in the current Olathe building to Hannah, who will continue to operate it. Hannah

will also assume operation of the Emporia and Lenexa offices.

Oltjen graduated cum laude from Kansas State University and attended dental school at the University of Texas at San Antonio, where he finished magna cum laude.

After dental school, Oltjen went on to earn his orthodontic and master of science degrees from the University of Oklahoma, where he graduated No. 1 in his class.

He is certified by the American Board of Orthodontists,

serves as the orthodontic advisor to The Great Plains Study Club, and is past president of both the Kansas Association of Orthodontists and the Greater Kansas City Society of Orthodontists.

Oltjen grew up in Hiawatha, Kan., and now resides in Leawood with his wife, Rita, and their three children. He is active in the community through involvement with Smiles Change Lives, Little Sisters of the Lamb and numerous school and community activities.
